People living with dementia in Oxfordshire


Dementia is an overall term for diseases and conditions characterised by a decline in memory, language, problem-solving and other thinking skills that affect a person's ability to perform everyday activities.

Increasing prevalence of diagnosed dementia

Between 2017/18 and 2018/19, the number of people (of all ages) registered with dementia at GP **practices** in Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group increased from 5,579 to **5,869**.

The prevalence of dementia in Oxfordshire increased from 0.75% to 0.77% of GP registered patients, similar to the England average (0.76% in 2017/18 to 0.78% in 2018/19).

Over 10,000 older residents expected to be living with dementia by 2027

As of 30 September 2019, there were 5,733 GP registered patients aged 65+ with dementia in Oxfordshire and the latest estimate of dementia diagnosis rate, suggests a total of 8,500 older people living with diagnosed and undiagnosed dementia in Oxfordshire.

On the basis of the forecast growth in older population, this could increase to 10,500 by 2027, an additional 2,000 people.

As of 1 December 2019, the Care Quality Commission recorded a total of 4.398 care home beds available for people with dementia in Oxfordshire, with the highest rate per population in West Oxfordshire district and the highest numbers in Oxford, Banbury, Witney, Cumnor and Chipping Norton.


